

A swallowing disorder, also known as **dysphagia** (*dis-fay-juh*), is a difficulty or inability to swallow.

Left untreated, swallowing disorders can have devastating effects on a person's physical and emotional wellbeing.

Speech-language pathologists assess, treat and manage swallowing disorders.

Signs of swallowing disorders (dysphagia):

- O Coughing episodes when drinking or eating.
- O Difficulty swallowing medication.
- O Feeling as though food is stuck in throat.
- O Avoiding certain foods or drinks because they are hard to swallow.
- O Feeling embarrassed to eat in public; eating is no longer pleasurable.
- O Finding it hard to chew and swallow food.
- O Weight loss.
- O Food, drinks or saliva falling from mouth.
